GREEN HEROES WIN SPECIAL RECOGNITION AWARD



At a Green Heroes reception held by The Conservation Volunteers at the Barbican in London recently, the Sonning Common Green Gym received a Special Recognition award to recognise that we were the pioneer Green Gym and that we are still continuing after 20 years.

Six members, including several originals, with Dr William Bird (ex. Sonning Common GP who initiated the Green Gym movement) accepted the award which consists of a plaque mounted on a hand carved wooden leaf together with a framed certificate.

During recent months we have worked

on many sites including installation of fencing at Aston Rowant Nature Reserve, clearance at Streatley Church Yard, and Peppard Memorial Hall, hay raking at Greys Court, ground management at Bishopswood Field for the football club and a new ongoing task at Stoke Row where we are working to help the Maharajah's Well trustees restore the Cherry Orchards and grounds partially to their original layout.

POSTCARD FROM THE ALLOTMENT HIBERNATION TIME - REST AND RECOVERY

Winter months are when the gardens go into hibernation and gather strength for the springtime.

The school allotment is also mostly asleep, but there are always jobs to be done and the mild weather so far means that there are still some plants awake!

Amy O'Connor, one of the allotment team, told me that the black radishes continue to grow, as well as the Jerusalem artichokes and onions. Helen, another member, has potted up lots of strawberry plants and put the other strawberries to bed for winter.

The team has also created an extension to the allotment and made some other layout alterations. The extension was completed by fencing off a small corner of the playing field and making a new entrance to the allotment and a 'back gate' to allow easy access to the water butts which are now situated at the base of the swimming pool down pipes. There are also some new beds ready to be sown in spring with flower seeds and areas for children to dig.

One of the projects on the list for 2019 will be the old plastic bottle greenhouse,

which is looking sadly neglected, but now is enclosed within the allotment area. It was built from empty 2 litre drinks bottles some years ago and hopefully can be given a bit of attention to make it useful again.

Mrs Fraser (Year 1 teacher) has had the children plant some beans in the largest bed during November, and the Kites children (reception age) made a bug hotel.

Amy said `It is great to be inspiring some teachers to get out and use the space.` •







LIBRARY GOES FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

A belated Happy New Year from the FoSCL committee – and a big thank you to everyone who supported the library through 2018. It was a good year, with library attendances up and more than 80 people either renewing their Friends' membership or joining us for the first time. The accounts – which were presented at the AGM in mid-November – show that we also had some tremendously generous donations; more than £600 on top of membership fees. That money more than made up for the loss of funds from Oxfordshire County Council, allowing us to buy lots of new books.

Fund-raising efforts brought in another £1,300 – money which meant the committee could provide some financial support for artistic events that we hope will draw new – and younger – readers into the library. We also want to buy a bigger selection of large print books and have plans to buy new noticeboards, a small sofa and an extra bookcase. The children's corner now has a beautiful new bean bag thanks to the generosity of the W.I.

Adele O'Connor stepped down from the Friends' committee at the AGM - although she will remain a volunteer. Thanks go to her for all her hard work - and to June Duckworth who kindly agreed to stand in her place.

More help is still needed with Story Time, Rhyme Time and the digital drop-in sessions – please speak to the library staff if you are interested. Ideas for new books, or how the library might be involved in other community events, are always welcome.



There are collection bins inside school for those who have pupils at the school for use during drop off and pickup times. LOST CITY - FOUND!

TREK TO CIUDAD PERDIDA, NOVEMBER 2018

Indiana Jones would've loved it: the trek to the Lost City in Colombia. He would've had no problem with the gelatinous mud, the rocky steps, the fast-flowing rivers to be crossed, the insects, the steep terrain, the humidity, the treefalls and the (on occasions) torrential rain. I, however, am no Indiana Jones and I found this trek particularly challenging.

There were 10 of us in our group, aged between 50 and 75, but we noticed that the majority of other groups on the trail were made up of younger people, probably under 40 years old – and they seemed to have far more energy than we had! kept going, sharing out the head torches, and eventually ended back at camp, having left it over 12 hours earlier. The problem with a 'there and back' route is that you can remember all the problems on the way there – and

However, all of our group completed the trek without recourse to the 'mule of shame' (having to ride a mule because the walk was too difficult). After a day and a half of (very) undulating track, and two nights under mosquito nets, we crossed a thighdeep, fast-flowing river and were faced with over 1,200 steps, uneven, slippery and ladder-steep, to the lowest level

of the Lost City. The site is huge - far bigger than the famous 'helipad' photo - and is comprised of several levels all joined by steep stony steps. There are no kiosks selling souvenirs (in fact there are few Lost City souvenirs anywhere in Colombia), but there is a house which provided a platter of fresh fruit for us to enjoy. After listening to talks about the history of the area, we headed back down the way we'd come and crossed the river again. After a while it started to rain - heavily. We kept going. We found the track blocked by a tree which had fallen recently and had to clamber over the debris in near darkness. We kept going, sharing out the head torches, and eventually ended back at

The problem with a 'there and back' route is that you can remember all the problems on the way there - and know that they'll have to be faced on the return. I found this knowledge particularly worrying. I'd already fallen in a stream on day 2, putting my camera out of action (and getting even more soaked than I already was!), and on the final day I managed to strain my heel, meaning that I limped my way back for the last four hours. But I felt blessed that it hadn't happened on the first day - how awful that would have

been, not to have reached the Lost City

So to all of you who have already sponsored me: thank you very much!

NEW UPDATED LOCAL PLAN LP2034 IS NOW OUT FOR CONSULTATION

This article provides a brief summary of the plan and how it will affect Sonning Common, compiled by Diana Pearman.

In May 2018 a decision was taken by councillors that officers should reassess sites in SODC to form a strategic allocation and prepare an updated plan for public consultation. As the Plan requires a 15 year lifespan, the end date has been extended from 2033 to 2034. Actions taken since May are ...

- The six local authorities in Oxfordshire have committed to providing 100,000 new homes as part of the Housing and Growth deal signed with the government.
- Changes have been made following the public consultation in October 2017
- National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF2) 2018 has been taken into consideration
- Changes in circumstances eg. Oxford to Cambridge Expressway
- Creating the Strategic Site Selection and potential allocations list, see below.

Sites nearer to Sonning Common(SC) have been discounted at this stage; Palmers Riding Stable, Playhatch and Reading Golf

Larger villages have a requirement to take a 15% growth above the Core strategy allocation. Homes that have already been built or have permission in SC are 269 so there are another 108 outstanding.

Smaller villages are no longer expected to contribute towards housing supply.

Affordable housing remains a 40% requirement except at sites on the edge of Oxford where it will be 50%.

Green belt Several of the new strategic allocations are in the Green Belt, which will have to be modified to take account.

Otherwise LP2034 states that green belt development will be limited to those deemed appropriate in NPPF2, unless there are very special circumstances.

Employment strategy largely unchanged at SODC requirement of 37.5ha between 2011 and 2034.

Infrastructure where interventions are necessary, planning permission will be granted for developments where the infrastructure and sustainability is already in place or will be provided within an agreed timescale.

Efficient use of land

The significant impact on SC will be how the LP2034 ensures efficient use of land. There is a new housing density policy which requires a minimum net density per hectare of 45dph which is almost double the Core Strategy minimum of 25dph.

To give context for this, Churchill Crescent is estimated to be 54dph.





The Local Plan 2034 has been out to consultation since 7 January and it will end at **5pm on 18 February 2019**.

In the light of this new information it will be extremely important for the NDP review team to adjust the plan accordingly.

A more heartening and supportive piece of information came from John Howell in his Christmas message:

"I was pleased to be able to introduce my own Private
Members' Bill in the House of Commons on helping to protect
communities that have made neighbourhood Plans."

LOCAL PLAN 2034

The planning committee considered the draft plan at a meeting on 17 December. Leigh Rawlins, Chairman of Sonning Common's planning committee expressed his concerns about the Local Plan 2034 and below are the points he made.

- It promotes excessive numbers of new houses beyond what Government formulas require. These figures are based on untested assumptions of future economic growth which may prove to be unfounded.
- SODC is proposing a fixed housing need of almost 23,000 new homes.
 Failure to meet this excessive, fixed target presents a major risk of a developer 'free for all' across the whole district.
- The proposed housing density figure for large villages like Sonning Common marks an 80% increase from 25 to 45 homes per hectare. This will

have the effect of urbanising our rural areas.

- The proposed density figures do not take consider or respect the individual characteristics of settlements and local circumstances. Having high-rise/ high density estates on the outer edge of villages is bad planning and will lead to a backlash against housing development.
- The current proposal will encourage speculative development.
- The Local Plan fails to provide for vital Settlement Boundaries to maintain separations between town and villages which promotes individual identities.

Consequently, this motion was sent to SODC following from the planning committee meeting of Sonning Common Parish Council on Monday 17 December 2018:

"This committee is deeply concerned about the housing figures proposed in

the draft Local Plan 2033 (2034), which are based on assumptions about future economic growth which have not been properly tested and may well prove to be unfounded.

Furthermore, the committee is fundamentally opposed to the new 45 dph density for future housing developments in large villages proposed in the draft plan. The committee regards it as wholly inappropriate to impose a single density requirement for an entire settlement irrespective of the individual characteristics of individual sites.

On this basis, Sonning Common parish council's planning committee calls upon the two district councillors for the area to do their utmost to have the draft plan as it stands rejected."

The plan was approved by SODC's cabinet on 20 December. Of our two district councillors, Paul Harrison voted in favour and Will Hall was absent'

EMERGENCY TREATMENT

The Parish Council is considering installing a defibrillator (emergency treatment in the event of a cardiac arrest) in the village centre, probably at the village hall. Although in an emergency it is capable of being used safely and easily by anybody, it would be helpful to have a number of residents with some basic training in its use. If we proceed with the purchase and installation, the Parish Council would organise one or more, as the demand dictates, short training sessions at the village hall conducted by an approved instructor. VILLAGE GARDENER TAKES BULBS TO INDIA

Andrea Baple recently visited a place called Kanthari in Southern India and took with her some Tête-à-Tête daffodil bulbs and photos of the work done by the gardeners around Sonning Common. The purpose of Andrea's visit was to see her granddaughter, Rallou, who has been working and studying in India for nine months. Rallou wanted to show Andrea this very special place where she had worked for three months and they visited Kanthari together. Andea was overwhelmed by this truly inspirational place that offers a sevenmonth programme aimed at people who have overcome adversity in their lives and who wish to help drive social and ethical change to make the world a better place. It was an experience she will never forget.

Participants of the course are truly diverse, and practical workshops are led by a group of international experts keen to share knowledge and skills that will change peoples lives for the better. Those taking part come with very different backgrounds. Some have university degrees, others have little formal education, some are blind or physically impaired in other ways and some have no disabilities at all. What all have in

common is the passion and motivation to make the world better and pass on vital skills to others.

Andrea felt extremely privileged to be there and helped Navina, who is blind and who wanted to teach other blind people in Nepal to cook. They worked together and made apple crumble for twentythree people! Sahiba from Tajikistan was applying for a grant to set up a chess club for able and disabled to work together in her home town of Vilka. Sahiba was passionate about enabling disabled people, who are normally outcasts, to get to tournament level in chess. Andrea was able to help with the form filling process in this case. Kabir was also an inspirational character. He was from Bangladesh and was bullied at school for having to look after and take his severely disabled brother to school each day.




Kabir wants to set up a sports academy for disabled and able bodied to work and play together. He told Andrea he wanted to bounce his ideas off a 'granny',

Andrea was able to talk about the work done in Sonning Common to help the village and shared photographs of the village. The strong sense of community was a common bond. The daffodil bulbs were planted out in a pot and the delighted gardener was looking forward to seeing if the bulbs resembled their photograph.

Kanthari is the name of a small very hot chilli that changes a dish from bland to spicy. It is also the name of this place that hopes to transform lives for the better.





SOME COUNTRYSIDE WALKS AROUND SONNING COMMON

1. Old Copse

There are three recognised OS Map footpaths running through this beautiful beech wood from the entrance at the end of Woodlands Road. These relatively flat paths go approximately north, northwest, and west respectively through this woodland to join up with roads bordering the wood to the north and north-west. The westernmost footpath leads towards the Bishopswood Sports Ground. The first part now belongs to the Parish Council, which has started a programme of controlled cutting back of the holly to prevent it from over running the footpaths and woodland glades. The rest of Old Copse is managed by the Woodland Trust www.woodlandtrust. org.uk Their website and also that of the Chilterns Conservation Board www. chilternsaonb.org have more information about what can be seen.

2. Footpath to Kidmore End

This starts from Kennylands Road at a point nearly opposite where Westleigh Drive joins it. It runs south-west down beside Kidby's Yard and then enters the AONB, with lovely views across fields. It can be used to access Kidmore End, but shortly before reaching the road a track running south-east crosses it. If this is followed past Vines Farm, it joins the footpath coming from Bur Wood, giving a circular walk back to Kennylands Road. If the Millennium Green is used to get to

Essex Way, then the rest of Kennylands Road has a pavement on at least one side, allowing a safe route back to the start of the walk.

3. Footpath to Bur Wood

This starts from Kennylands Road along a section of it which has no pavement on either side, so is best approached via the Millennium Green, which has a metal kissing gate exit almost opposite the start of the footpath. The first section is along a driveway to some properties, and then it veers to the right alongside some fenced-off horse paddocks, before reaching a wide field which is accessed through a kissing gate. Up to this point the path is wide and flat, with just the odd bump or root along the way. The footpath across the open field is also flat. but then drops as one leaves the field and passes between Bur Wood on the left, and Rudgings Plantation on the right. Both have a lovely display of bluebells in the springtime. The ones in Rudgings Plantation on the right are sooner, and more easily, accessed, with only a slight slope down to the track leading through the woodland, with good views of the bluebells on the gentle slopes above. The walk to and from the road up to this point is relatively flat, but still allows good views of paddocks, an open field, woodland, and bluebells in the spring.

The footpath now drops down through the woodland and then rises again as it passes beside a wide-open field in the AONB. It leads to Chalkhouse Green Road, but shortly before reaching that it crosses the track leading past Vines Farm towards Kidmore End, thus linking up with Walk 2 above, giving a circular walk in the opposite direction.

4. The Chiltern Way

This long-distance footpath, the Chiltern Way extension, www.chilternsociety. org.uk/ - runs east-north-east from the minor road just off the B481 running beside the Bird in Hand pub, and south-west from the bus stop at the start of Kennylands Road, situated near Gardeners Copse, passing through the end of the Millennium Green in between. Near Sonning Common it is the southwest section which has the more open views, although this area has not yet been designated as AONB!

This is just the start of an article informing residents about possible walks around Sonning Common.

The role of the PPG is to be a 'critical friend' to the practice. We are there to gain information about responsiveness and quality of services, from a patient perspective, therefore being able to provide informed insight back to the practice.

understanding of health issues and services available to patients.

The Sonning Common Health Centre PPG will communicate and research regularly with the patient and practice users about current Health Centre issues and advances as well as any other concerns or recommendations they may have. This helps us to optimise knowledge of the patient population and make sure they are as informed as possible. In turn we can then help make their whole Health Care experience as efficient as possible.

EAR WAX REMOVAL

Patients will need to book an appointment directly with the Tripp Hearing team; their contact information is on our website. You can alternatively visit their website www. tripphearing.co.uk or ask for a business card when you are next at the health centre. This is a private clinic for micro suction (not ear syringing), costing £85 for an appointment. The price is the same for one ear or two ears being checked and treated. If there is no wax present the audiologist will perform some tests to explore why your ear/s are feeling blocked. Please note that our nursing team here at SCHC only provide ear syringing for:

- patients for whom the ear nose and throat department at hospital have requested ear syringing
- patients who are pre-referral to Audiology (hearing clinic) Do ask a member of our Reception team if you have any questions about this.

GOOK'S CORNER

VALENTINES OYSTERS - serves 2

8 fresh oysters

2 green peppercorns

2 red peppercorns

4 shallots, finely diced

2 cloves garlic, crushed

4 limes, (zest of 1, juice of 4)

chopped basil to taste

chopped coriander to taste

50ml olive oil

Get your fishmonger to show you how to shuck the oysters or do it for you. Keep the base part of the shell for presentation. Crush green and red peppercoms in a mortar and pestle. In a mixing bowl add your finely diced shallots, crushed garlic, zest of 1 lime, juice of the limes, peppercoms and your freshly chopped herbs. Whisk in your olive oil and leave to infuse for 20 to 30 minutes before using with the oysters. Arrange the shells on a serving plate and place the oysters back in their shell. Just before serving spoon over the marinade to fill the shell. (Don't do this too soon as the oysters will cook in the lime juice in about 10 minutes or so).



JACKIE'S CR COLUMNIA

HEART BOUQUET VALENTINES CARD

This idea can get a bit messy so have newspaper to hand to cover up any surfaces and aprons at the ready!

What you'll need:

- Card
- Paint
- ScissorsGlue
- 0.1.
- Colouring pens
- Shaving foam and dish
- Fork or kebab skewer
- Ruler
- Small piece of ribbon







1) Cover the base of the dish with shaving foam.



Lay a piece of white card on top of the foam. Gently push down on the card to transfer the paint pattern then lift the card from the dish.



5) Take another piece or card and fold in half to make the base for your design. Using the coloured pens, draw the stalks for the flowers in your bouquet.



Squeeze paint into the dish. Using a fork or kebab skewer, drag the prongs through the foam to make a pattern.



 After a minute or two, use a ruler to scrape of the excess foam then leave to dry – you should be left with a pretty marbled nattern.



6) Tie a piece of ribbon into a bow and stick to the stalks to hold the flowers together.

7) Once dry, cut heart shapes out of the painted card – these will form the heads of the flowers.
